

THE POSTER SESSION

There will be a poster session at this year's Conference. The major theme will be **Management**. This will be a good opportunity to talk to those people actually doing the management. Posters will be attended by authors on Wednesday night from 8:40pm to 9:40 pm. Refreshments will be served.

CONFERENCE FEES

Lodging and meals are a package deal at \$120.00. The registration fee is \$40.00. These fees cover room and board for three nights (Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday) and eight meals and three breaks, starting with dinner on Tuesday evening and ending with a break around 10:00am on Friday. Field trips are also covered. Check-in is 2:00pm Tuesday; check-out is 12 noon on Friday.

Why can't we accept vouchers or credit cards? We are sorry about this inconvenience, but it just cannot be helped. The Annual Conferences are organized with seed money from the previous year and the balance of the expenses are paid by incoming conference fees. Consequently, we make many arrangements with vendors "betting on the come". Our vendors are extending to us a great deal of advance credit by allowing us to pay down payments to get things done in advance of the Conference. It is too much for us to ask them to wait another 30-40 days after the conference to get paid for their services. Moreover, many state and federal agencies have different rules about vouchering and it is just too much of a nightmare to sort out!

THURSDAY'S FIELD TRIPS

Chautauqua National Wildlife Refuge Birding Field Trip

Maximum 30 (Need Rubber Boots)
This field trip will begin by examining the site of a heronry which is located on an area that was once clear cut. The tour will continue through Sand Ridge State Forest to a site where efforts were made to close a fragmented forest. A presentation entitled *Fifty Years of Change on the Illinois River*, by Frank Bellrose, a nationally-recognized expert on waterfowl, will conclude the field trip.

Funks Grove

Maximum 100

In 1824, Isaac Funk and his family left Ohio to make their home at the edge of a large prairie grove in McLean County, Illinois. The impressive oak-hickory forest which initially attracted the Funks has been preserved by family descendants. Today, its unique blend of cultural and biological resources make it one of the premier prairie groves in the Midwest. The field trip will begin with a presentation in the Funks Grove Chapel on sugar maple succession in oak-hickory forests by Dr. John Ebinger, Eastern Illinois University.

Henry Allan Gleason and Gopher Prairies

Maximum 50 (No tennis shoes--cactus spines!)

These two sites of 110 and 6 acres, respectively, are unique among the sand prairies of Illinois. In 1904, Henry Allan Gleason began his study of the Illinois River sand deposits at a large sand dune known locally as Devil's Neck. It was here that he discovered the silvery bladderpod whose nearest population is in Red Wing, Minnesota. The primary plant communities are blowouts and dry sand prairie in which little blues stem is predominant. The Gopher Prairies in Sand Ridge State Forest formed in unique bowl-shaped depressions where dry sand prairie is the primary plant community. Flower-of-an-hour is a common plant on these prairies. These three sites are among the least disturbed and most picturesque of the Illinois River sand prairies. Hay racks will be used for transporting participants to the site.

Manito Prairie Nature Preserve: Participate in or observe a fall prairie burn

Maximum 25 (Sturdy boots, cotton or wool clothing)

Manito, the Indian name for the Great Spirit, was chosen as the name of this site. The unique plant community here is gravel terrace prairie, a very scarce plant community in Illinois. The only known Illinois population of the Tennessee milk vetch is present, plus populations of kittentails and curly mully grass. The preserve overlooks the wide and scenic Illinois River Valley. You can participate in a fall prairie burn. Strong backs and hearts a must. Fire equipment will be provided; wear cotton or wool clothing--no polyester, please! Pyromaniacs John Schwegman, Kandy Nyboer, and Jim Helm will lead this trip.

Mason State Tree Nursery

Maximum 100

This 120-acre site is one of two nurseries owned and operated by the Illinois Department of Conservation. Both hardwood and conifer trees are grown here, plus a large number of prairie grasses and wildflowers, including some threatened and endangered species. The tour will examine seed production plots on the nursery, as well as the packing and cold storage facilities. Seed and plant collection and storage methods will be discussed.

Matanzas Prairie Nature Preserve

Maximum 25 (Need rubber boots)

Many years ago, there was a town in Mason County named Matanzas. It ceased to exist but the wet slough nearby survived and is today the only remaining example of wet sand prairie in the Illinois River sand area. Three prairie communities are recognized in this 30-acre site: wet prairie, sedge meadow, and mesic prairie. This site is also home for rare plants and animals, including the Illinois chorus frog, the tubercled orchid, and auricled foxglove.

Miller-Anderson Woods Nature Preserve

Maximum 50

Old-growth upland and ravine forests, sedge meadows, seep springs, and floodplain forests are present at this 340-acre preserve. Marsh marigold and skunk cabbage are present in the seeps, and queen-of-the-prairie, a state threatened plant, is present in the sedge meadow. The state threatened Schreiber's aster can be seen in the rich wooded ravines.

Peoria Park District Hill Prairies

Maximum 12 (bring gloves and a strong back)

Do you want to become involved in hill prairie management? Come along on this field trip. Learn how to treat exotic species such as sweet clover and aggressive native species such as rough-leaved dogwood. Tools will be furnished to actually cut and remove these plants from the prairie. In addition, learn about some excellent glacial drift hill prairies in the Peoria area.

Prairie Insect Field Trip

Maximum 50 (no tennis shoes--cactus spines)

Charles A. Hart, a close field companion of Henry Allan Gleason, made extensive collections of the insects of the Illinois River Sand Prairies in the early 1900's. More recent collections of butterflies and bees on these prairies support Hart's statement that the sand prairies of Illinois serve as refugia for a large number of more western prairie obligate insects. Preserved specimens will be used to demonstrate species present earlier in the year. Henry Allan Gleason Nature Preserve and the Sand Ridge Prairies will be utilized for this field trip which will concentrate on butterflies, flies, wasps, and bees.

Revis Nature Preserve

Maximum 50 (steep climb to the top!)

In 1831, James Revis and family from Kentucky settled near a large freshwater spring along the bluffs of the Sangamon River in Mason County, Illinois. By 1838, Revis, his wife, and two children had died. Time has obliterated any recognizable feature of their graves high on the bluffs overlooking what was then called Bull's Eye Prairie in the Sangamon Bottoms. The Revis name has endured, as have the extensive hill prairies in the vicinity. Today, Revis Hill Prairie is recognized as one of the largest and best quality many rare prairie butterflies inhabit the site. These prairies were studied intensively by Dr. Robert Evers and described in his classic publication *Hill Prairies of Illinois* (1955).

Sand Prairie-Scrub Oak Nature Preserve

Maximum 100 (no tennis shoes--cactus spines)

In pioneer days, Mason County was among the last counties to be settled. Most people regarded the extensive sand prairies as nothing more than deserts. This 1480-acre preserve is the largest remaining area of sand prairie and savanna in the Illinois River Sand Area and one of the premier sand prairies of the Midwest. Dry sand prairie, dry sand savanna and blowouts are the primary plant communities. Several endangered plants and animals are present, including Gray's sedge, small burhead, and the western hognose snake. Several grassland bird species inhabit the site.

Wildlife Prairie Park

Maximum 100 (tennis shoes OK on this one)

Do you know the prairie animals? This site has them: bison, elk, wolves, badgers, and cougars. This is an opportunity to view all of these animals at one place in surroundings much like conditions on the unbroken Illinois prairies. Interesting and informative displays are also present in the visitor center, and prairie restorations are present in the park.

Trip leaders: Kay Matthews, Marge Bjorklund, and Debbie Heidevald.


PARKING
